


## Welcome
















## A Better World







## A Better World — Volume 6

Ensuring the health of the oceans and their resources is critical to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals. However, human activities such as unsustainable fishing practices, harmful fisheries subsidies, and ineffective waste management resulting in marine pollution, such as from plastics and nutrients, continue to threaten the oceans.

Further pressure is consequently placed on environmental systems, like biodiversity and natural infrastructure, while creating global socioeconomic problems, including health, safety and financial risks. In order to combat these issues and promote ocean sustainability, innovative solutions that prevent and mitigate detrimental impacts to marine environments are essential. World leaders must also work to protect marine species and support the people who depend on oceans, whether for employment, resources, or leisure.

A Better World: Volume 6 will focus fully on conservation and sustainable use of the oceans, seas and marine resources. A Better World will be a fully illustrated 200-page book with over 80 authors relating their work in active efforts to make Goal 14 a reality. Their commentaries will draw upon experiences around the world at international, regional, national and local community levels of activity.

A Better World will reflect the progress and challenges in this essential topic, highlighting good practices in a wide variety of societies and disciplines. The book will be

launched in time for the 2020 United
Nations Conference to Support the
Implementation of Sustainable
Development Goal 14 in Lisbon
in June 2020.

# Key subjects to be covered in the book

#### 1. CORAL REEFS

Coral reefs are one of the most diverse ecosystems on earth.

#### 2. IMPLEMENTATION OF INTERNATIONAL LAW

This COA aims to support its members in implementing their voluntary commitments related to implementation of international law as reflected in UNCLOS.

#### 3. MANGROVES

Mangroves are highly productive ecosystems providing numerous goods and services that include support of fisheries, maintenance and improvement of water quality.

#### 4. MARINE AND COASTAL ECOSYSTEMS MANAGEMENT

Diverse area-based measures and management tools can be used to sustainably manage, protect, conserve and restore marine ecosystems.

#### **5. MARINE POLLUTION**

Marine pollution from human activities can be found at all points across the ocean's vast expanse, whether in the deep, at the surface, or in the organisms that live in it.

#### 6. OCEAN ACIDIFICATION

Ocean acidity has increased by roughly 26% since pre-industrial times because of increased releases of CO<sub>2</sub> due to the burning of fossil fuels and other human activities.

#### 7. SCIENTIFIC KNOWLEDGE

Sustainable management and conservation of the Ocean requires a solid and trusted knowledge base upon which decisions are based.

#### 8. SUSTAINABLE BLUE ECONOMY

The Ocean are central to sustainable development globally, and particularly for Small Island developing States and coastal least developed countries.

#### 9. SUSTAINABLE FISHERIES

Marine fisheries are a key source of economic and food security, providing livelihoods for the 300 million people involved in the sector.
